#### P.G. Diploma in Museology and Conservation

P.G. Diploma in Museology and Conservation will be of two Semesters, based on Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) prescribed by UGC, i.e., Semester-I and Semester-II. Each Semester shall have four papers. Each Student shall have to pass all eight (08) papers in P.G. Diploma in Museology and Conservation programme and each paper will be of 100 marks-

A. Internal examination (two mid semester examinations), assignments, seminar presentation, etc., will consist of 40 marks as following:

Two internal examinations (15 marks each): 30 marks
Assignment/ Seminar/Presentation: 10 marks

External Theory Examination: 60 marks

(B) The duration of examination for theory papers will be of three hours. Each paper will have 10 questions covering all units. Five question are to be attempted by the students and each question will carry 12 (twelve) marks.

All the papers included in different semesters, would be compulsory. In the second semester, the 8<sup>th</sup> paper will consist of Field Study and Project Report. There will be four major core course papers in each semester; each paper will have four credits. All The major core course papers in each semester will be divided into four Units. The semester examination will be based on Credit System.
